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Repartee with Craig McKee A self interview

Could you make your answers brief?

It depends on your questions. Most would consider it a miracle.

Why are you in Rotary?

Dad proposed me in 1985 some 20 years after Wayne Schomer proposed him for membership. As Gary Schomer knows, it's a required thing for a son if you live here.

What was your best Rotary experience?

Dad's district conference when he was District Governor in 1990-91. I was dating Diann at the time and it was her first exposure to Rotary. Plus, everyone was astonished to see that I could get a date for the dinner.

How did you meet Diann, by the way?

Blind date set up by a Ro-

tarian, Denise Bell. Denise even brought Diann to Rotary for an advance look, but she couldn't single me out when Denise said, "It's the guy over there with the thinning hair." Luckily, she agreed to meet me anyway.

You have a high profile at Rotary, but surely there are some things they don't know about you. What would surprise them?

I didn't go to the second grade. Dr. Bert Porter (a Rotarian) tested me and said it would be a waste of time and that third grade would suit me best after the first grade. Bert specifically concluded, however, that I was verbal for my age, but not a genius. It's on paper. Later experience would prove Bert to be very perceptive.

Anything else?

Most people think I'm a huge sports fan, mostly because of my sportswriting days at the old Terre Haute *Tribune* and at *The Indianapolis Star* while I was in law school. I don't mind watching sports, but I'm not an addict any more. Baseball lost me with the strike in 1994. I boycotted for a year and discovered that I didn't miss it. I still enjoy spectator sports on television and in person, but pro athletes are complete bores for the most part. I know more about what's going on in the New York theatre business than I know about baseball now.

Theatre? Where did that come from?

The performers give all they have. The talent is phenomenal. The proximity and electricity of the theatre experience trumps almost all sports experiences, and I've attended six World Series games, All-Star games (NBA and MLB), two NCAA basketball finals, and many, many professional and college games.

Almost all?

Well, there was that Larry Bird year.

What else do you consider a hobby?

You mean other than eating? Reading, travel, and volunteer work.

Most recent books you read?

Blink by Malcolm Gladwell, *1776* by David McCullough, *Bernie Goldberg's 100 People Screwing Up America*, and currently *The City of*

Falling Angels by John Berendt.

And travel? We were in Italy for 10 days in September. Splendid trip. Beautiful, interesting sites. Good wine and food.

We're deep into this and you haven't mentioned Washington National Cathedral once. I hoped you would ask. Serving the Cathedral as the president of the National Cathedral Association is one of the great honors of my life.

What are your responsibilities there?

The NCA has 14,000 members—and so the first job in my three-year term is not to lose members. We will be assisting with a major fund raising campaign and participating in the Cathedral's centennial in 2007. The NCA president has the only "automatic" seat on the Cathedral Chapter, the board that governs the Cathedral and oversees its \$20 million annual budget. I don't often impress Diann, but when she saw that I had my own permanent seat in the Cathedral's Great Choir as

a Chapter member with a name plate screwed into the pew, she decided I had amounted to something for once.

And your greatest experiences there?

President Reagan's funeral—simply an unforgettable experience, even if that sounds a bit odd speaking of a funeral. The installation of Dean Sam Lloyd earlier this year was also quite moving, especially because I was on the search committee.

Does Rotary fit into all of that, too?

You bet. The warden of the Cathedral College is a Rotarian and we talked the other day about how Rotary changed the world with a big idea—eradicating polio. Lots of organizations talk a big game but they get lost in the talk. Rotarians took on a big idea and delivered, a model that should inspire governments, churches, and volunteer organizations everywhere.

as a Paul Harris Fellow, an honor named for the founder of Rotary. The Terre Haute club has long been prominent in the Paul Harris Fellow program. To maximize participation, the club established a series of 10-for-1 clubs in which 10 members would make an annual gift of \$100 and then elect one of their members for PHF recognition

annually. Four such clubs currently operate in the Terre Haute club. RI's Foundation also established additional recognition for second- and third-tier Paul Harris recipients who contribute additional funds to the Foundation. Our own **Ed Niemeyer** and **Dale McKee** are among the multi-tiered donors, for example. RI's Foundation has been a key fund raiser in the global effort to eradicate polio. Its

stated mission is "to support the efforts of Rotary International in the fulfillment of the Object of Rotary, Rotary's mission, and the achievement of world understanding and peace through local, national, and international humanitarian, educational and cultural programs.
